

“International Criminal Law” Research Group

This research group will examine the idea of international criminal justice and its implementation through national and international ways. We will be discussing the nature of international criminal law as well as its purpose and objectives. We will also be looking at the historical development of international criminal law with close analysis of Nuremberg and Tokyo trials as well as Rwanda and the Former Yugoslavia trials. We will mainly focus on the International Criminal Court as it is a permanent court. We will discuss the jurisdiction and admissibility standards to understand how the Court works and where it stands in the whole picture of international criminal justice. We will also explore the core crimes such as crimes against humanity, genocide, war crimes and crime of aggression and we will have the chance to discuss some of the current global crises. We will also specifically discuss what the general principles of liability in international criminal law are and how it differs from national understanding of criminal liability. Finally, we will examine the defences in international criminal law by discussing several case law examples from different courts. During these research group meetings we are planning to do a class role play activity over a fictitious case scenario in which the students will get the chance to play the prosecution or defence in a fictitious trial.
